**Toxic Free Schools (SB 426)** 

Oregon school districts and regulatory agencies have never been given the funding, coordination and resources needed to implement the safer pesticide use practices called for in Oregon's laws. SB 426 will fix a 14-year unfunded mandate for schools, fix an oversight that omitted the Oregon Department of Education in the original statute and create a path towards modernized record keeping and safer choices for pest control under the Healthy and Safe Schools Act.

The Toxic Free Schools Act will:

- End a 14-year unfunded mandate by providing resources and technological assistance to school districts to reduce harmful pesticide use.
- Coordinate requirements under the existing School IPM statues and the Healthy and Safe Schools Act for the first time since their passage.
- Modernize pesticide record-keeping processes and increase transparency for communities.

<u>SB 426</u> was voted out of the Senate Education Committee on March 30th with bipartisan support and has been referred to the Joint Ways and Means Committee to address its fiscal impact.

## **Toxic Free Cosmetics (SB 546)**

People assume personal and beauty products (collectively called "cosmetics") are safe. But it is estimated there are over 10,000 chemicals in the beauty market today, and account for a \$100 billion beauty industry. The Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetics Act (FDCA) has only restricted 11 chemicals since 1938, while the European Union has banned over 1800 chemicals.

Through SB 546, Oregon can require the public disclosure of all chemical ingredients on a company's product webpage. Doing so is an accessible way for consumers to make educated purchasing decisions. Additionally, it will ban the sale of the worst chemicals in cosmetics and personal care products like many other states have.

SB 546 passed out of the Senate Energy and Environment Committee on March 28th, *unanimously* and bipartisan, and has been referred to the Joint Ways and Means Committee to address its fiscal impact. It was initially sent straight to the Senate floor because no fiscal impact has been found for this biennium. We urge this committee to refer SB 546 out back to the Senate floor, and commit to funding a part time staffer within OHA starting in 2027 for this critical toxics reductions program.

Oregon Incinerator Pollution Monitoring (SB 488)			
SUBJECT: Yes on SB 488 Waste Incineration Emissions Monitoring

My name is and I live in and I am writing/speaking to urge The Ways and Means Committee to fund and vote yes on SB 488A, which gives the Oregon DEQ the authority to adopt a pilot program to require continuous emissions monitoring technology at the Covanta Marion waste incinerator in Marion County.			

The Covanta Marion incinerator is the nation's 4th largest medical waste incinerator. Burning medical waste produces heavy metals and dioxin that drift away from the incinerator's stack and drop down on surrounding communities. Incineration doesn't destroy waste. What incineration does is to change the form of the waste, increasing the availability and toxicity of many of the pollutants it contains, and then releasing these pollutants as dangerous air emissions. Burning plastics, particularly medical waste, increases the risk of exposure to heavy metals such as lead and mercury as well as dioxin. These hazardous chemicals are associated with serious health harms such as cancer, learning disabilities and organ malfunction.

An important reason to pass SB 488A is to modernize and update emissions monitoring systems. Our state regulators need accurate emissions data to meet their mandates to protect the environment and public health based on the best scientific data available. Continuous emissions monitoring is the most effective means of providing accurate and detailed measurements of what Covanta is emitting into the air of the Willamette Valley.

Please fund and vote yes on SB 488A to support sound scientific practices as the backbone for Oregon's air protection regulations.
