Eugene City Council endorses the Declaration on Human Rights and Climate Change

Eugene steps forward to be the 2nd city in the world to endorse

EUGENE, ORE. – On February 12th, in a 7-1 vote in favor, Eugene, Oregon became the second city in the world to endorse the International Declaration on Human Rights and Climate Change (and the first city over 100,000).

Eugene Mayor Lucy Vinis said, "I am proud of our city for being the second in Oregon to formally express our support for the Declaration of Human Rights and Climate Change which reflects long-held values in our community."

The resolution to endorse the Declaration was brought to the Council by Beyond Toxics and the Eugene-Springfield NAACP. Beyond Toxics, an Oregon-based environmental justice organization, has joined with a major network of international human rights advocates for a call-to-action to governments around the world. The guiding principles for this call-to-action are expressed in a *Declaration on Human Rights and Climate Change*. The Declaration was drafted by the Global Network for the Study of Human Rights and the Environment, the largest network of human and environmental rights scholars in the world.

One of the Declaration's authors is Dr. Tom Kerns, has been at the forefront of an international movement on human rights advocacy and action. Kerns, a former Beyond Toxics board member, worked with a team that includes numerous world-renowned environmental and human rights scholars who drafted the Declaration as a clarion call to governments to address the human rights implications of climate change. The Declaration is one of a convergence of initiatives reflecting the need to understand human rights as intrinsically threatened by climate change.

Lisa Arkin, Beyond Toxics' Executive Director said, "The Declaration foregrounds human rights in our work to address climate change. As more Oregon communities suffer the effects of fires, floods, excessive heat and drought, focusing on human rights puts our advocacy work squarely at the intersection of environmental and racial justice, worker rights and the destruction of natural resources."
